

Research study opportunity at the Caribbean Games

When: A research team from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign will be at the inaugural **Caribbean Games** in Guadeloupe to conduct a research study.

What: They have partnered with the Caribbean Regional Anti-Doping Organization (RADO) to learn what young athletes know about anti-doping rules and to learn about the sources of influence in their lives. The study involves completing a **questionnaire** that will take about **30 minutes**. Participants in the study will receive **USD \$10**. All information collected will be confidential.

Who: To be in the study, participants need to be an athlete between 15 – 22 years of age; be a Junior/Elite or Junior Competitor (or equivalent for their sport); and be able to speak and read English fluently.

Athletes under 18 years of age:

Will need parental or legal guardian consent to participate in the study and a **Parental Consent Form** will need to be completed. The form can be accessed using this link <https://tinyurl.com/CaribbeanGames-ParentConsent> or scanning this QR Code:
